



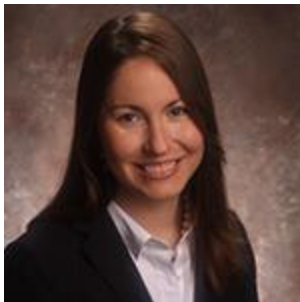

The plans were unveiled for the new arena during the opening ceremonies for the 87th annual Arcadia All-Florida Championship Rodeo.

The Mosaic Arena will not only offer greater capacity and functionality for the annual Arcadia Rodeo, but it will also provide new opportunities to host other community-enriching events that will benefit the entire region.

Bo Davis, Senior Vice President, Phosphate Operations, and board member of The Mosaic Company Foundation, stated, "This is an important next step in a continuing partnership between two organizations that share a long-term vision to see Arcadia and DeSoto County grow and prosper."
